

Allegheny County Juvenile Probation's 2022 Balanced and Restorative Justice Report Card

Since 1996, the Probation Department has been focused on achieving the goals of our balanced and restorative justice mission and legislative mandate:

- Community protection
- Accountability holding juvenile accountable to restore victims and communities
- Competency Development provide opportunities for juveniles to acquire skills that lead to law-abiding and productive citizenship

These goals have been refined and clarified over the years but remain our guiding principles. In 2010, the Pennsylvania's juvenile justice system leaders officially launched the Juvenile Justice System Enhancement Strategy (JJSES), a comprehensive initiative designed to develop and implement evidence-based tools, practices, and interventions that would improve our outcomes. JJSES fundamentally transformed "how" we go about achieving our BARJ goals.

During the last twelve years, the system has worked tirelessly to fully integrate the components JJSES into the daily activities of our probation department. The successful melding of JJSES with BARJ is reflected in the revised mission statement and goals of Pennsylvania's juvenile justice system:

Mission

To support and enhance the values, principles, and programs that advance the goals of Balanced and Restorative Justice while employing evidence-based practices whenever possible.

- 2. Accountability
- 5. Data-Driven Decision Making

4. Evidence-Based Practices

For over 25 years, Allegheny County has been collecting key outcome data at the time of case closing to determine if we are attaining our goals. In 2022, the Court closed a total of 419 cases. Key outcome data for those case closures is below.



Community Protection


88% of youth successfully completed supervision

Competency Development


59% of youth were involved in a productive competency development activity at case closing

Accountability


98% of youth fully completed community service, and 86% fully paid restitution to victims at time of case case closing

Data-Driven Decision Making

The risk level of most youth decreased at time of case closing in 2022, as measured by the validated Youth Level of Service risk assessment instrument
